<p>Description</p>	<p>◆ This chart provides information about which muscles are supplied by major nerves to the posterior aspect of the upper limb. It illustrates the nerves which make up the cervical and brachial plexus as well as showing the major nerves that supply the scapula, back of arm and hand. Important educational information is provided about the nerves and which muscles they innervate. The main diagram names the major nerves and confirms the muscles they supply. As with the other charts in the set it provides an excellent visual reference from which to learn.</p>

<p>Image</p>	<p>MAJOR NERVES OF THE UPPER LIMB POSTERIOR ASPECT</p> <p>The chart includes several sections of text and a legend:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> CERVICAL PLEXUS: Formed by the anterior rami of the first four cervical nerves (C1-C4). It supplies the neck and shoulder region. BRACHIAL PLEXUS: Formed by the anterior rami of the fifth, sixth, seventh, and eighth cervical nerves (C5-C8) and the first thoracic nerve (T1). It supplies the upper limb. AXILLARY NERVE: A branch of the posterior cord of the brachial plexus, it supplies the deltoid and teres minor muscles. RADIAL NERVE: A branch of the posterior cord of the brachial plexus, it supplies the deltoid, teres minor, and various muscles of the arm and forearm. ULNAR NERVE: A branch of the medial cord of the brachial plexus, it supplies the muscles of the forearm and hand.
